

"Imagine you have just had a wonderful afternoon at the beach with a friend. When you return home, you find a huge truckload of dung has been dumped right in front of your door. There are three things to know about this truckload of dung: 1) You did not order it. It's not your fault. 2) You're stuck with it. No one saw who dumped it, so you cannot call anyone to take it away. 3) It is filthy and offensive, and its stench fills your whole house. It's almost impossible to endure...When a truckload of dung is dumped in front of our house, we heave a sigh and then get down to work. Out come the wheelbarrow, the fork and the spade. We fork the dung into the barrow, wheel it around the back of the house, and dig it into the garden. This is tiring and difficult work, but we know there's not another useful option."

Recently, I parked in front of a Michael's Arts and Crafts store. I opened the car door and instinctively stepped aside as a red truck was easing out of the spot next to mine. As it pulled away, I saw "Heritage, Not Hate" painted in white lettering on the tail gate. A confederate flag was waving radically above the printed text.

Entering the store in a confused state of mind, I said aloud, "What the devil was that about?" No one answered. Meandering slowly down one aisle of faux Christmas greens (Yes, already!) and turning to push my empty cart down another, filled with skeletons and orange pumpkins sporting grumpy faces, I thought about what I had witnessed in the parking lot. I surmised that maybe the phrase "Heritage, Not Hate" is someone's attempt to celebrate southern heritage while also, trying to dispel the idea that the confederate flag is not a symbol of hatred. I understand wanting to be proud of one's heritage but not at the expense of increasing pain experienced by others.

Although I cherish the challenges my ancestors endured to make it possible for me to have a fulfilling life, I am sad to say that some of my descendants fought in the civil war for the south. I'm not proud of the ugly truth of my personal heritage and I certainly don't want to rejoice in the past.

To wave a confederate flag, a symbol, a reminder of a time of hatred, is to continue to promote pain. When I observe such displays celebrating the ugliness of the past, I am not a proud American. Frankly, I am trying to understand how others think doing so is a positive action.

Although I cherish my ancestors who endured challenges in order to make it possible for me to have a fulfilling life, I am sad to say that some of my descendants fought in the civil war *for the south*. I'm not proud of the ugly truth of my personal heritage and I certainly don't want to rejoice in the past.

If an American wants to be proud, I suggest flags and auto signage that reads:

"My future is yours. Your future is mine."

"In all my perceptions, I could be wrong. Let's talk."

"Ignorance is not bliss. Help me to grow."

"Life is a globe. Am I located anywhere near justice and true understanding?"

May it be so.

Serene Harbor Visit

Recently five members of FFP took a tour of Serene Harbor, one of the local non-profit organizations we support. We learned that one in three women in America is victims of domestic violence. Over 40% of female homicides victims in the U.S. are killed by an intimate partner. In Brevard County there are 11 incidences of domestic violence per day. Serene Harbor is a shelter that provides peaceful, safe refuge and life-changing services to victims of domestic violence, and their families as well as their pets.

Serene Harbor is a member of the Florida Coalition against Domestic Violence and one of 42 sites in Florida. The facility has 20 private rooms and can accommodate children from newborn to 18-yrs of age. They even accept family pets. On the grounds there is a playground for the children and a grassy yard for the pets. The facility has a large stocked kitchen and laundry room. Each resident has a private room.

The average stay for a resident is 25 days, but there is no limit to the number of days a client may stay and they may return more than once.

The staff consists of a CEO/Program Director, who has served for 27 yrs, a public relations representative, a case manager and a legal advocate. All residents receive safety planning, relocation assistance; community education and professional training. There are also support groups that meet regularly.

We were very impressed with the facility and all the services they provide. It is reassuring to see such a well-managed, facility with a kind, caring staff helping families in distress.
